Dear Ms. Pierson:

I am writing to request your approval for a renewed waiver to permit city employees to promote the 2020 YouthWorks campaign's goal and objectives. The attached solicitation application and this letter approved by the Board of Estimates on February 12, 2020. The following information provides background information on the City's summer jobs program and the specifics of the annual YouthWorks campaign.

YouthWorks Program: YouthWorks is a Baltimore City government sponsored program administrated by the Mayor's Office of Employment Development (MOED). Each year, the program places several thousands of City youth between the ages 14-21 in a five week, 25 hours per week, paid work experience. Our younger teens (14-15 years olds) that have little or no previous work history are placed at highly structured public sector worksites where they learn basic workplace skills and develop positive work habits. These teens are paid minimum wages for hours worked and are issued debit cards where there pay is loaded via the City's HRIS/payroll system. Over 400 non-profit community-based organizations, as well as many city and state agencies, provide supervised worksites for these youth.

Our older youth (16 and above) have the chance of work in private industry and are matched to jobs in their area of career interest. Businesses that agree to participate in YouthWorks hire the pre-screened youth and put them on their payrolls at wages commensurate with their work assignment. MOED oversees all aspects of the program's operation including youth registration/job assignment, hosting and worksite development, job development and job match, site monitoring and all payroll functions.

The YouthWorks Campaign: Called "Blue Chip-in" in the 1980's under Mayor William Donald Schafer, the YouthWorks Campaign was originally created in response to significant reductions in federal funding for youth employment. While Mayor Martin O'Malley later renamed the program "YouthWorks." The campaign's goal of putting city teens to work during the Summer months has remained the same.

With limited government funding available to support summer jobs, the campaign reaches out to area businesses, individuals, non-profit and philanthropic organizations, and invites them to donate funds that are used to pay the wages of youth placed in public sector worksites or to hire youth to work in their companies and pay their wages. It will cost approximately \$1500 to support one teen in the upcoming YouthWork 2020 program. Contributions to the campaign are tax deductible as they are made to the Baltimore City Foundation, a non-profits, 501(c) (3) organizations, on behalf of the YouthWorks. A list of all contributions and the amounts of their donations are printed in the Baltimore City Foundation's Annual Report.

The Campaign is led each year by Mayor of Baltimore City and members of the YouthWorks leadership team, typically comprised of representatives from our City's businesses, faith-based and philanthropic communities. The campaign employs a variety of strategies to solicit support including media exposure, direct mail solicitation, and presentations conducted by leadership team members and MOED staff, etc. Underscoring the campaign is the shared belief that Summer jobs are Everyone's business, which is reflected in the energy and excitement that successfully, engages all sectors of the City. The Mayor's cabinet, including MOED, and many City employees participate in sharing information about YouthWorks and help generate a broad awareness about the program's benefits and return on investment.

We will be continuing our campaign "Hire One Youth" for the 2020 YouthWorks program. In addition to asking employers to hire our youth and or make financial contributions to support youth wages at public sector work sites, the campaign will solicit active business sector engagement in helping prepare City teens for 21st century jobs. Employers will be invited to provide career presentations, host job shadowing experiences and provide mentors to workers throughout the summer. Contributions to YouthWorks are also garnered through annual Combined Charities campaign now known as the United Way of Central Maryland and through voluntary payroll deductions.

ACTION REQUEST OF THE BOARD OF ESTIMATES

The Board is requested to endorse a governmental/charitable solicitation application for submission to the Board of Ethics of Baltimore City for the Mayor's Office of Employment Development's 2020 YouthWorks Program (the period of the campaign will be effective upon Board of Ethics approval January 1, 2020 – December 31, 2020.

AMOUNT OF MONEY AND SOURCE OF FUNDS:

There is no general money associated with this request. However, it will involve the solicitation of funds throughout the period of the campaign.

BACKGROUND/EXPLANATION:

Persons to be solicited include private and non-profit employers, philanthropic organizations, citizens and city and state employees. Solicitation strategies to these groups will include: media outreach, as well as direct mail from the Mayor, the Mayor's personnel, staff of Mayor's Office Employment Development, and the YouthWorks Leadership Team, which includes the YouthWorks Leadership Team. Solicitation will occur through presentations and support of special fundraising activities with proceeds going to support the YouthWorks program.

A potential donor list will be comprised of individuals and corporate entities that contributes to the economic, social, and cultural vitality of Baltimore City. Most of the individual and corporate entities fitting that description are no controlled donors. However, those potential donors who are controlled donors with respect to the City or the Board of Estimates with not be targeted or singled out in any way and will be solicited, if at all, in the same manner as the other potential donors.

Once the approval of the Endorsement of YouthWorks is received by the Board of Estimates, a formal application will be submitted to the Board of Ethics of Baltimore City, which will note the Mayor's Office of Employment Development will be soliciting donations for its 2020 YouthWorks program.

Baltimore City Code Article 8, Section 6-26, prohibits solicitation or facilitating the solicitation of a gift. An exception was enacted in 2005 to permit certain solicitations that are for the benefit of an official government program or activity, or a City-endorsed charitable function or activity that has been approved by the Ethics Board. Ethic Regulation 96.26B sets out the standards for approval, which includes the requirement that the program, function, or activity to be benefited and the proposed solicitation campaign must be endorsed by the Board of Estimates or its designees.
